# \* MUSEUM HAPPENINGS \*

Saturday, January 28th, Museum Avenue is the venue for the Art and Culture Fusion Fest. Craft, Art, and Food vendors will line the street. A variety of musical entertainment will go on all day. Dance performances, therapy dogs, and classic cars are some of the featured attractions.

Fruit cobbler topped with vanilla ice cream will be served up in the dining car. Sloppy Joe sandwiches will also be available while they last.



If you have been curious about the bread pail in our Brown 'n' Serve Rolls exhibit, you will want to be in the dining car for a demonstration of its use. The demonstration is set for 11 am. The entire process will take about three hours. The dough is mixed in the pail and allowed to rise. It is then turned out onto a floured surface, formed into loaves and/or rolls, and then allowed to rise again. The baking takes only about 35 minutes.



Samples for tasting will be available when the bread comes from the oven. It is possible to make 4 loaves of bread in one batch in the pail. Once all the ingredients are in the pail, it takes about 200 turns of the handle that is connected to the large pastry hook, shown at right, (or about three minutes) for the dough to be mixed.



# \*\* MUSEUM EXPANSION PROJECT \*\*



A lot of history has been made at this important Avon Park landmark. Hall of Famers, Negro League stars, and high school champions have "hit for the fence" and run these bases to the cheers of thousands of baseball fans over the past 100 years. The stories of epic games and records made and broken will be told in exhibits in the addition to the Depot Museum.

### BASEBALL MEMORABILIA IS NEEDED This is an opportunity for ath-

letes to share things that help us to tell the story of Baseball in Avon Park. There will be a lot of display space on the walls for photos and posters. Exhibit cases will be designed for artifacts such as uniforms, trophies, gloves, bats, and other such things. Rosters, programs, award certificates and other documents of note can also be displayed.

Items may be donated to be included in our permanent collection or loaned for temporary exhibits. Temporary exhibits are usually mounted for special occasions or centered around a current activity and are usually in place for under 6 months.

We have secure, climate controlled storage space available while exhibits are being designed. Items may be brought to the museum during regular operating hours. It is helpful to have an inventory of memorabilia before our curator begins designing the exhibits so we know what stories can be told. If you have items that you are ready to part with or share, please see us.

## Make a Valentine

Long before the advent of email, snap chat and Instagram, sending greeting cards was the popular way to remember friends and relatives on special oc-

casions and holidays.

Ancient Chinese exchanged messages on bits of paper expressing good will to celebrate the new year. Early Egyptians sent their messages on papyrus scrolls. The oldest greeting card on display, made in 1400, is in a museum in London.

From Christian martyrs to Chaucer to Shakespeare, Valentine's Day can be traced back to Ancient Rome. One story is that the holiday is named for a St. Valentine who was martyred for marrying persecuted Christians in ancient Rome. But it is the Victorians who made Valentines Day into the holiday we know today. Rather than purchase a ready-made valentine, some Victorians assembled original valentines from materials purchased at a stationer's shop: lace, bits of mirror,



bows and ribbons, seashells and seeds, gold and silver foil appliqués, silk flowers, and then added messages like "Be Mine" and "Constant and True."

Mechanical valentines, also known as sentimental movables, trick valentines, or novel valentines, became popular as people stopped buying the earlier Victorian valentines. Often these mechanicals would have moveable parts and stands.


#### March 26th
